The winner of the professional trophy with 82 points was James Nicol of Minnigaff, Newton Stewart. George McLachlan of Borgue was the winner of the amateur/trophy with a final score of 73 points. The Alex Smith Boulder Dyke Trophy which is awarded to the best dyker on the field from the Stewartry was won by James Nicol. Second and third in the professional class were Trevor Wragg from Buxton and Allan Airley of Dalbeattie.

At the moment, with two competitions to go, Allan is placed third best dyker — but he is determined to try and claim the top spot.
