
◄ Chronology of Ownership & Occupancy ►

- 1788 Nos 59 & 61 High Street were feued, each with a plot width of 30' and length 144'.
- 1841 & 1851 Hugh Campbell, blacksmith lived with his family in Fleet Street.
- 1877 Blacksmiths Alexander Stewart Campbell and William Black Campbell bought 59 High Street. It is most likely that the Campbell brothers built a blacksmiths workshop at the far end of the garden. Alexander Campbell lived with his family at 59 High Street for both 1891 and 1901 census returns.
- 1923 Sisters Jessie & Edith Campbell owned 59 High Street and sold Plot 1 to Samuel Corrie, blacksmith. The Campbell family were blacksmiths and Plot 1 included their smithy and a garage. Plot 1 measures 58' 9" by 30'
- 1933 Samuel Corrie sold his personal interest in Plot 1 to the business of S&T Corrie (Samuel & Thomas).
- 1949 S&T Corrie sold Plot 1 to Rural Industries Loan Fund Limited who had a separate agreement with William Mackay to repay the loan over 15 years.
- 1964 Mackay now owns Plot 1 including the smithy.
- 1968 59 & 61 High Street plots occupy 144' from High Street backwards. The library garden terminates with a masonry wall. Nos. 67 & 69 High Street gardens ended with the same wall and then a line of trees. The remainder of the ground between (a) the mill lade, (b) the Old Bobbin Mill, (c) the Deil's Elbow workshop that once belonged to Peter Jardine, and (d) the western edge of 69 High Street, was all land owned by Mrs Murray Usher. This is noted as Plot 2 in the above plan, and in 1968 Mrs Murray Usher sold all this land to Willie Mackay who erected a number of industrial-sized greenhouses on this land.
- 1978 Ownership of plots 1 & 2 was divided between Willie & Annie Mackay.
- 1986 Willie & Annie Mackay sold a piece of land 6.1m square (Plot 4) to Jack Pickthall in order for him to build an extension to his Deil's Elbow workshop.
- 1990 The Mackays bought from the Baxters at 61 High Street the piece of land at the bottom of their garden. It is plot 3 in the plan below and measures 58' 9" by 30' roughly the same size as plot 1.
- 1990 Willie & Annie Mackay sold The Smithy plot to John & Susan Whittaker. Damage to the old smithy resulted in it being demolished and replaced with a narrower and shorter building which allowed a wider vehicular entrance. The residential property which is now The Smithy was built.
- 1991 A plot of land measuring 6'6" (Plot 6) was sold by Mrs Murray Usher's executors to the Mackays and also agreed that the land could be used for residential purposes. This land has become the "turning area" for vehicles.
- 1991 John & Susan Whittaker sold a piece of land 1m wide (Plot 5) which immediately overlooks the old mill. The company that bought this land no longer exists as it was owned by the Whittakers who are now deceased.
- **2006** The Executors of John Whittaker sold The Smithy to Graham & Margaret Wright. During the sale process a number of boundary issues were cleared.
 - The lade does not have a visible dog-leg: the change in direction is under the Fire Station building.
 - The turning area was included within the plot. It was owned by Willie Mackay (deceased).

• The boundary with 67 & 69 High Street properties were re-drawn in line with existing fencing.





1859-60 Valuation Roll:

John Swainson owned a house and smithy that was tenanted by Hugh Campbell, blacksmith.

This could well have been what is now no.3 Victoria Street, opposite The Smithy. The part of the building next to the lade might have been the house, with the remaining workshop and/or store being the smithy. It is possible that Hugh Campbell remained in this property after Alexander moved into 59 High Street and William moved to Bridge Terrace.

1891-92 Valuation Roll: Alexander Stewart Campbell and William Black Campbell were proprietors of a house and garden in High Street – no occupiers name given.. They were also proprietors of a

workshop in Victoria Street.

We do not know whether the workshop was part of what is no.3 Victoria Street or if it was a purpose-built smithy across the road in the grounds of 59 High Street.

1900-01 Valuation Roll: Alexander Stewart Campbell and William Black Campbell were proprietors of a house and garden in High Street – no occupiers name given.. They were also proprietors of a

workshop in Victoria Street.

Nicholas Campbell, wife of William B Campbell also owned 4 houses in Victoria Street. She lived in Fleet Street.

1912-13 Valuation Roll: Alexander Stewart Campbell & William Black Campbell, retired blacksmiths, owned a house & garden in High Street (no.59). The house was occupied by Roger Walker, wood merchant, whilst the workshop was tenanted by James Anderson, blacksmith.

Nicholas Campbell, wife of William B Campbell also owned 3 houses in Victoria Street. Alexander & William also owned at least 3 houses in Bridge Terrace, one of which William occupied.

William Campbell also owned 7 houses in Catherine Street – all rented out. Alexander & William also owned much, if not all, the Old Brewery buildings – rented. Alexander & William also owned all of Rosebery Terrace – one empty, the rest rented.

The Campbell family owned 2 houses in High Street, a workshop, stores and houses in

Victoria Street as well as several houses in Rosebery Terrace, Catherine Street, the

Brewery, Neilson Square, and Bridge Terrace. 1920-21 Valuation Roll:

Sisters Jessie & Edith Campbell owned 59 High Street and sold Plot 1 to Samuel Corrie, blacksmith. The 1923 Campbell family were blacksmiths and Plot 1 included their smithy and a garage. Plot 1 measures 58' 9" by 30'.

Samuel B Corrie is listed as being the owner / occupier of a workshop etc in Victoria 1925-26 Valuation Roll:

Given that we have a photo of William & Alec Campbell outside a 'significantly weathered' smithy it is clear that the building could have been built in the 1860s or 1870s when Hugh Campbell bought 59 High

The Valuation Rolls seem to list the 'workshop' as being in Victoria Street, and clearly it would have been accessed from Victoria Street. However the smithy remained in the title deeds for 59 High Street until the Campbell sisters sold it to Samuel Corrie in 1923.

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
