WILLIAM CROSBIE & SONS GATEHOUSE OF FLEET

A Brief Chronology

- 1867 William Crosbie born at Borgue.
- 1885 Probably started work as an ostler at the Murray Arms Stables in Gatehouse.
- 1890 Married Jessie Mary Girvan at Kirkcudbright.
- 1895 In partnership with Horatio G Murray Stewart of Cally, borrowed £1000 and took over Murray Arms Stables, with 20 horses.
- 1908 First car purchased. There was probably a phased replacement of horse-drawn vehicles by motorised ones.
- 1910 First bus purchased in 1910 (SW 130). This probably led to providing garage services as a business.
- 1910 Obtained the mail contract from G.P.O. : mail collected 03:30 a.m. at Tarff, delivered to Twynholm & Gatehouse P.O.s.
- 1929 No longer had mail contract : maybe William saw the future market in motorised transport and its maintenance.
- 1930 William snr. and his 5 sons formed partnership of William Crosbie & Sons Automobile Engineers.
- 1935 Built Woodside Garage in Gatehouse on one of the drained mill ponds. Managed by William snr. assisted by Chris & Jack.
- 1935 Murray Arms proprietor Mr Payne resumed running of the Old Posting Stables as the Murray Arms Garage.
- late 1930s Built Creebridge Garage in Newton Stewart, managed by William jnr. and James (Nick).
- 1940 William jnr. left the business under acrimonious circumstances and George shared management of Creebridge with Nick.
- 1940 Wife Jessie died aged 74
- 1945 William snr. died aged 78.
- 1968 Crosbies sold Woodside Garage to Mr Mathews from Edinburgh.
- c.1990 Woodside Garage acquired by Rogersons of Borgue
- $c.2005-Woodside\ Garage\ closed\ and\ demolished\ with\ plans\ for\ new\ housing\ development.$

Gatehouse Brothers Retire

Two well-known Gatehouse brothers, Messrs. Christopher and Jack Crosbie, have retired from the motor engineering firm of Messrs William Crosbie and Sons which was founded by their father, the late William Crosbie in 1895.

The establishing of the business goes back to the days of the coach and horse. In 1910 the firm obtained the mail contract for the G.P.O. and this continued until 1929. During this period the mail was collected from Tarff Station at 3:30 a.m. and delivered to the Twynhom and Gatehouse post offices. Despite the adverse wintry conditions then experience, the firm had numerous commendations for having the mail delivered in good time.

Also in 1910 the firm purchased the first motor coach in the area, named "The Argyle", a handsome 16-seater, registered number SW 130. Top speed was 18 miles per hour, and it was used daily on the Gatehouse – Kirkcudbright route, return fare 1/6d.

Following the death of the founder in 1930^* , the partnership of Christopher and Jack developed quickly in promoting one of the most modern garage premises in the South of Scotland, where the workshop resembled a well-kept modern home. Despite long hours of work and a busy life, both partners have been keenly interested in everything pertaining to the welfare of the community, which they have both served so well.

The new owner is Mr S.R.P. Mathews of Edinburgh, who intends to continue trading as William Crosbie and Sons.







